Dear President Rivera Schatz and Speaker Méndez Núñez:

Pursuant to Section 202 of PROMESA and our letter to you dated March 25, 2020, we write to submit a proposed compliant budget for the Emergency Measures Support Package described in said letter. The proposed compliant budget being submitted herewith consists of a proposed Joint Resolution (attached hereto as Exhibit A, the “FY2020 Emergency Measures Support Package Budget”) that was submitted to the Oversight Board today by the Governor and which reflects the Emergency Measures Support Package described in our letter of March 25, 2020, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B, with certain adjustments that were agreed to by the Governor and the Oversight Board.

In accordance with the schedule set forth in said letter, we are submitting the FY2020 Emergency Measures Support Package Budget to the Legislature for its review and approval by March 27, 2020 at 5:00pm and subsequent submission to the Oversight Board. The Oversight Board shall determine whether the budget as approved and submitted by the Legislature is consistent with the FY2020 Emergency Measures Support Package Budget, in which case the Oversight Board will approve it and submit it by March 27, 2020 at midnight to the Governor and Legislature as a compliant budget. The Oversight Board looks forward to continuing to work with you for the benefit of the people of Puerto Rico.

Dear Governor Vázquez Garced, President Rivera Schatz, and Speaker Méndez Núñez:

As announced earlier this week, the Oversight Board is seeking to grant urgent budgetary support for Puerto Rico for an Emergency Measures Support Package amounting to \$787 million. This significant budgetary allocation is designed to give the Government real assets to be able to respond to the impactful, meaningful difficulties arising from the Emergency Measures instituted to contain and mitigate COVID-19. For detailed information about the Emergency Measures Support Package, please see Exhibit A which describes the sources of funding for the \$787 million. Moreover, this Emergency Measures Support Package is in addition to authorizing access to \$160 million in Puerto Rico's Emergency Reserve Fund for public education, supplies, equipment and cost share needs related to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Oversight Board is fully committed to supporting the Government and people of Puerto Rico, and these recent actions are continued evidence of that.

The \$787 million Emergency Measures Support Package will be funded with \$500 million from the Commonwealth fiscal year 2020 surplus as a special appropriation, \$157 million as a reapportionment within the current fiscal year 2020 Commonwealth General Fund budget, and \$131 million from Federal funds.

For the Oversight Board to certify a budgetary appropriation for the \$500 million special appropriation of the Emergency Measures Support Package, the Government must follow the procedure established under Section 202 of PROMESA. Accordingly, the Oversight Board, pursuant to Section 202(a), determines that the Governor must develop and submit a budget consistent with the Emergency Measures Support Package by March 26, 2020 at 5:00pm. Consistent with Section 202(b), the Oversight Board hereby submits a forecast of additional FY20 revenues of \$500 million as a special appropriation. After the Governor submits a budget

consistent with the Emergency Measures Support Package by March 26, 2020 at 5:00pm, the Legislature must review and approve it by March 27, 2020 at 5:00pm. Once this work is completed by the Governor and Legislature, pursuant to Section 202(c), the Oversight Board shall determine whether the budget is consistent with the agreement, and the Oversight Board will approve it and submit it by March 27, 2020 at midnight to the Governor and Legislature as a compliant budget. Separately, the Governor shall submit to the Oversight Board a \$157 million fiscal year 2020 Commonwealth General Fund reapportionment request.

The Oversight Board agreed with the Government of Puerto Rico's implementation of the following measures in response to COVID-19:

- To accelerate, immediately, the increase in unemployment insurance weekly rates originally scheduled for July 1, from a minimum of \$33 to \$60 and from a maximum of \$190 to \$240. The funds for this increase are available in the existing balance of the Unemployment Fund.
- To not disconnect services of PREPA and PRASA for those unable to pay.
- To implement the deferral of several tax filing dates, such as the income tax filing deadline to July 15, which are intended to provide support to the private sector which is experiencing a shock to their cash flow during the emergency period. Moreover, to suspend the 10% withholding tax on professional services for three months.
- To pause collection of the Commonwealth sales and use tax (SUT) at the ports and within the supply chain for three months, and to waive penalties for non-compliance with twice-monthly SUT reporting and remittance, as well as missed payments on estimated income tax bills for two months. These measures are incremental to those already approved to reduce SUT for prepared food until April 19, at an effective cost of \$17 million, and exempt SUT on first need items until April 30, at an effective cost of \$7 million.

We genuinely look forward to working with the Government, Legislature, and private sector to review additional economic recovery tools that may be necessary at a later date after considering and incorporating the multiple Federal stimulus packages made available to Puerto Rico.
